Dear Chairman Frelinghuysen:

As always, I am deeply thankful for your continuing commitment to and concern over the safety and wellbeing of the 3.4 million American citizens who live in Puerto Rico, who are trying to rebuild their lives and find normalcy after the catastrophic conditions imposed by Hurricanes Irma and María.

As stated in our letter dated December 15, 2018, our Governor's team has been working intensely to assess Puerto Rico's immediate, short-term and long-term needs. Additional information became available after we were provided with the Governor's estimates attached to my previous letter, which altered the requests for funding to be addressed in the upcoming Supplemental Disaster Appropriations Bill.

Although I include a copy of the Governor's further request, please note that the request attached herein varies from the one includes with our letter in the following terms:

- The request for HUD CDBG-dr was increased from \$19.55 billion to **\$46 billion**. This increase corresponds to the following:
  - An increase from \$15 billion to \$31 billion to account, not just for immediate needs, but also short- and long-term housing needs;
  - An increase from \$2.3 billion to \$8 billion to account, not just for immediate needs, but also short- and long-term infrastructure investments from FEMA;

- An increase from \$1.75 billion to \$750 billion for the immediate support of economic recovery and tourism programs;
  - An increase from \$ 500 million to \$6.25 billion to account, not just for the non-federal cost share already incurred under FEMA's Individual Assistance programs, but also for the short- and long-term cost sharing portion related to FEMA funds.
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- The request in **Medicaid** funding is increased from \$11.2 billion to **\$11.35 billion** to cover 100% federal match for 24 months, and following that, for 3 years at the current funding level of \$1.6 billion per year;
  - New request for **\$2.2 billion** in funding for **Department of Transportation** programs;
  - New request for **\$2 billion** in funding for **Department of Agriculture** programs; and
  - New request for **\$1.8 billion** in funding for **U.S. Army Corps of Engineers** programs.

The American citizens living in Puerto Rico have suffered devastation in a scale of unprecedented destruction. We need the assistance of our National Government to rebuild the Island in a way that not only allows us to build back the way we were before, but to recover in a manner that makes Puerto Rico more resilient in the future so that we can avoid a crisis of this scale from ever happening again.

I look forward to continuing to work together with you to move forward these proposals, to create a rebuilding process for future emergencies that provides the opportunity to demonstrate America's commitment to its citizens' recovery and the development of new opportunities.

Dear Mr. Majority Leader, Mr. Speaker, Mr. Democratic Leader, and Ms. Democratic Leader:

Congress is now entering its last week of legislative activity this year. I implore you to use this critical window of opportunity to approve an emergency funding supplemental package that dedicates the necessary resources for Puerto Rico's recovery and reconstruction.

As you know the 3.4 million American citizens of Puerto Rico have been battered this year by two of the most powerful hurricanes in history, which unleashed level of destruction the scale and scope of which knows no historic precedent in the United States. While we have demonstrated an outstanding level of resilience, patience and will, we need help from Congress to fully recover. The ultimate fate of our island and community rests largely in your hands.

We are grateful for the support and funding that Congress provided in the previous emergency supplemental, but none of that funding was provided to support Puerto Rico's recovery efforts. We now need to begin the process of long-term recovery and reconstruction in earnest, and only you can allocate the level and types of resources to make that possible. To assist in this process, my administration presented the Build, Back Better report on November 13, 2017 to document our needs, using the best available information at that point in time. The report detailed both the unprecedented scale of destruction that we experienced as well as the federal resources needed to rebuild the island in a way that not only allows us to build back the way we were before, but to recover in a manner that makes Puerto Rico more resilient in the future so that we can avoid a crisis of this scale from ever happening again.

Time is of the essence. The most critical emergency funding needs that we are requesting from Congress in the supplemental funding package are as follows:

- \$46 billion in funding for Community Development Block Grant Disaster Relief
  - \$31 billion to address disaster housing needs, \$15 billion of which is needed immediately so that Puerto Rico can initiate programs to address the needs of the island's housing stock
  - \$8 billion to supplement infrastructure investments from FEMA to allow Puerto Rico to build back in a manner that meets future needs and which provides increased resiliency (a minimum of \$2.3 billion of which is needed immediately)
  - \$750 million needed immediately to support economic recovery and tourism programs
  - \$6.25 billion for cost-share related to FEMA funds (at least \$500 million of which is required in the short-term simply to address non-federal cost share already incurred under FEMA's Individual Assistance programs)
- \$11.35 billion in funding for Medicaid to cover 100% federal match for 24 months and following that 3 years at the current funding level of \$1.6 billion per year
- \$2.2 billion in funding for Department of Transportation programs
- \$2 billion in funding for Department of Agriculture programs
- \$1.8 billion in funding for U.S. Army Corps of Engineers programs
- Statutory language in the Stafford Act to maximize resiliency and mitigation efforts for the rebuilding of Puerto Rico

As Governor, I recognize that the funding being requested is significant, and that it demands accountability. Puerto Rico is prepared to provide that to the American people. In building a resilient Puerto Rico for the future, I am determined to ensure that this recovery and rebuilding process will be the most transparent use of federal funds in U.S. disaster response history. Toward this end, I collaborated with FEMA and other Federal agencies to establish the Central Recovery and Reconstruction Office (CRRO). This organization is providing oversight and is implementing strict financial controls in cooperation with FEMA and other federal partners to ensure that there will be full accountability and to make the most out of every dollar that is allocated to our recovery. A detailed presentation on the CRRO's role and structure is also attached for your reference.

Congress must not delay action on Puerto Rico's supplemental request. The 3.4 million American citizens residing here need to have hope for a better future, and that cannot happen without a significant commitment of resources in support of our recovery. No Governor should ever be put in the position of having to deny that hope in the aftermath of a catastrophic disaster due to the inaction of Congress. America must rise again to the challenge, and make good on the promises of support and solidarity offered by the scores of Members of Congress that have visited the island since the hurricanes passed.
